“ I remember at age 3 sitting on the floor of the back seat of his car as it bounced over Winter, Wisconsin, dirt backroads at 55+ mph, him driving. If I had sat on the back seat my head would have hit the ceiling. That's why I sat on the floor.

I remember him carrying me to Mom when I knelt on a needle and got it stuck and broken off in my knee in Winter.

I remember as a toddler thinking about kicking the sticks of a fire Georgie & Charlie and the little boys had built inside a hollowed out spot inside the bales of hay in their barn on their property. Had I done that, none of us would have survived the fire.

I remember talking with him about religion and how he feels about God, and feeling a kindred spirit in that I think we both of us were/are rebels and think for ourselves more than what we're told. I know he lives with God and God is a good host, better than any of us is. I didn't know about MaryAnn, but I wished I could have told him about the 2019 movie, Jim Allison:Breakthrough, about the Texas man who won the Nobel prize in 2018 for Medicine for curing cancer using the immune system, turning it on to recognize and attack cancer. That would have been interesting to him, because of Jan dying of Leukemia. I never got used to calling him Charles as he requested instead of Charlie as I knew him at age 3.

We would go through the woods to the neighbors to retrieve our runaway dog Blackie frequently.

So glad he kept in touch over the years so well. All the Frenzel men of his Dad's and his generation were storytellers and bullshitters of a high order (including my Dad and my brother), and could go on at length. I wonder if his children can too?

Glad we had him for so long. Wish we could have had him longer, but I'm sure he's having a good time with family in heaven, and I expect to see him in dreams. I promise you that if you ask Jesus to pass on a message to Charles, he'll get it, and to anyone else you want to reach, too.
