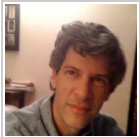

“ I met Eric in September 1970. We both pledged the same fraternity at MIT, Theta Xi, and the same major, Metallurgy. We roomed together for much of the next four years. Since Metallurgy was a small department it was great to have someone who understood the gripes and trials of our classes.

He was amazing, with stories of his youth, Eric's father worked for GE Turbines, so Eric spent most of his early life overseas. He learned Portuguese from his Brazilian nanny before he spoke English. He was thrown out of Lebanon in 1967 after the Arab-Israeli War, and finished high school in Rome.

After graduation he went to Inland Steel, starting as an inspection metallurgist at the slab dock. He held a number of quality-oriented jobs in the mill, then went into operations, He became an expert in the raw materials to make steel, and was in charge of planning the raw materials procurement. During this time Inland became Ispat Inland, then Mittal Steel, then Arcelor Mittal, at the time the largest steel company in the US. His final position was vice president of purchasing. He worked for 41 years there, a rare thing anymore.

Eric was my best friend. He had opinions on everything, and usually pretty sensible ones. He had a phenomenal memory and could reminisce about things that happened decades ago. He had a wicked sense of humor.

I can't believe he's gone. I will miss him very, very much.
