Not long after a serious surgery that I had in 2007 I got a call from Jerry inquiring as to my health. He had been sick as well but he cared only about how I was doing. I never forgot that and never will. Jerry was a terrific guy and one of the nicest, sweetest men I ever met. His time was too short here but I am thankful to have known him and learned from him.
