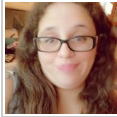

“ Lee and I were classmates for many years at John H. Vohr School and at Horace Mann School in Gary.

Lee and I played together in the Mannbridge Little League for the Shaevel Drug Store Cubs in the Mannbridge Little League.

The infield for the Cubs (circa 1961-1963) consisted of Lee at 1st base, his first cousin Bob Shaevel at 2d base, and Alan Ascher (who lived at Taft Place and 5th Avenue) at 3d base. I was the shortstop.

Lee would also pitch. Often, when he pitched, I would move over from short to be his catcher.

Lee was a left-hander, which was rare in our league. He also had more strength and more speed than any other pitcher in our league. As with most Little League pitchers, control was not his forte. Most batters were terrified of him. Those who were brave enough to swing at his pitches usually struck out. Those who were too terrified to swing often walked. He may have hit as many batters as batters got hits off of him.

Lee and I were in all kinds of activities together, including in Cub Scouts.

Whether in school, in the neighborhood, or on the ball field Lee was always enthusiastic and full of energy. We rode our bikes together all over the West Side. When his family moved -- as I recall while Lee and I were in junior high or high school -- to Griffith, it was a huge loss for our little circle. Lee was a great friend.

I hope that it is some comfort and consolation to your family and you know that Lee is remembered with warmth and affection.

May Lee's memory forever be as a blessing.
