She was your daughter in every way. You had a profound impact on so many. You encouraged all of us to do our best. You taught us about God, love, friendship and loyalty. You taught us to do what made us happy, to find our path and run down it. You taught me to enjoy life. Work hard, play hard. I never minded sharing your love with everyone else, because you had so much to give. You let our house be the house where my friends all gathered. A safe place.

You are the best person I know. No matter what, it was always you and me. I could always count on that. I could always count on you. You tailored your life to what was best for me. You did your best so that I did not grow up to fast. I never heard you or dad talk bad to/about each other. After being in law enforcement for 18 years, I never realized what a blessing that alone was. I remember it as

quite a shock when I found out everyone wasn't like that. You shielded me from what I didn't need to know about, while still letting me grow up. You let me make my own mistakes, while still guiding my choices. While family and friends surely saw a more human side of you, this is what I saw.

To me, you were always my mother first, but also my mentor, my friend, my coach, my adviser, my rock. You were my Cub Scout Leader. You taught me about God, devotion, faith, honor, and integrity. You were fearless. Nothing could hold you back. You taught me how to throw a ball and swing a bat. I dressed up as Velma from Scooby Doo for halloween because you taught me that there was no limit to putting a smile on my son's face. You stayed up until 3am the night before my prom to sew a tie and cummerbund because I wanted to be different. After Dad passed away, you took me camping to fill that void. I don't think you cared for camping much but you never let on. While camping there was a halloween costume party and I didn't have a costume. You put me in a garbage bag and filled it with leaves. I was a momma's boy and was pretty proud if it. You were your own person. You did what was right, not what was popular. You always taught me to do the right thing no matter what. If there was ever a question, you always told me to choose the harder path. That has served me well over the years. I know Lisa appreciates the man that you raised.

Thank you for giving me the life that I wanted. Thank you for teaching me right from wrong. Thank you for loving me unconditionally and teaching me how to love. Thank you for teaching me about God's love. Thank you for being you. I hope that I am half the parent that you were, to your grandson. I wish that you could have watched him grow up, but I know you will be watching him fr
